## **BOP Maths Mind Competition**



Maths Mind is an annual junior mathematical competition. Schools in the wider Bay of Plenty Region are invited to send teams of Year 9 and Year 10 students.

The Year 10 contest starts first, followed by the Year 9 event.

Each team of 4 has 20 problems to solve in the allocated 45 minutes. With 5 points being awarded for each correct answer, the winners are the teams with the highest number of points.

This year we entered two Year 10 groups and two Year 9 groups. The Year 10 teams began strongly, dealing with some interesting questions that had teachers scratching their heads. The winning team gained 90 points and our top TGC Year 10 team gained 70 points. This was 4 questions fewer than the winning team. One of our Year 9 groups did extremely well, facing stiff competition, to come second in their round. This team got a total of 85 points. ## **Underwater Hockey World Champions**

Underwater Hockey has had many successes over the past few weeks during the Age Group World Championships held over August in Sheffield, England. Three Tauranga Girls' College, past and present students were selected for New Zealand's national teams and competed at the Championships. Ariya Momo Hongcherdchai (18 years old), a past student from the class of 2018, was selected for the New Zealand U19 Women's Team and won gold at the Championships.

This U19 team had some quite 'easy-going' round robin games, dominating their grade consistently, but then had a contrasting, nail biting final against Columbia. Fortunately they managed to come away with a 3-2 win. Kirsty Burrows (22 years old), also a past stu-

dent, from the class of 2015, was selected for the New Zealand U24 Women's Team,

along with current Tauranga Girls' College student, Eloise Sharpe (17 years old). The Women's U24 teams were extremely close in the level of play, with the top four teams only beating each other by 1-2 points during round robin games. The New Zealand U24 Women's team, however, also came away with the gold, after some very close games in their semi final and final. They beat South Africa in their semi final which went into overtime and sudden death and in their final against France, one of the New Zealand players was sent out of the pool because of injury. After a very eventful and hard fought game, New Zealand came away with a 3-1 win. Both U19 and U24 Women's teams brought the cups home to New Zealand, and are back to back winners of the Age Group World Championships.





# Kapa Haka

A new beginning arose yesterday as our kapa haka group 'Te Tauranga o Ngā Waka' performed to a full school assembly. To see our rōpū (group) present a 25 minute bracket (that takes 10 months of practice) was an exceptional performance. Matua Ed (tutor) and co have done an amazing job.


# **BoP Regional Checker of the Year Competition**

# Information regarding the Benchmark Exams

All Year 11, 12 and 13 students, are on exam leave from Monday 16 September – Tuesday 23 September to sit the Tauranga Girls' College Benchmark examinations. These examinations are a practice for the NZQA External examinations starting on 08 November and, are sometimes referred to as the derived grade examinations. A derived grade is used to support a student who, for reasons beyond her control such as illness or trauma, either cannot sit an NCEA exam or, has their performance impaired during the NCEA examinations. For this reason it is important that students prepare themselves thoroughly for the Benchmark examinations. These examination results will also give students valuable feedback on any gaps in their learning as they prepare for the final examinations in November.

If a student is legitimately unable to attend an assessment (eg due to illness or family bereavement), then please notify Mrs Umbers through the School Office 578-8114, on or before the day of the exam, to organise for the exam to be re-scheduled. Please follow this in writing with a Medical Certificate or a letter from home.

The school follows NZQA examination regulations for the Benchmark examinations and assessment is not rescheduled for any circumstances other than illness or a family crisis.

This is a week that is focussed on learning and the school does not organise co-curricular activity for senior students during this week.
