ARTIST OF THE WEEK

Grace Tak Year 10

My work is meant to reflect me using various techniques, colours and other details. My work mainly shows my Korean side rather than my New Zealand side which is often the only side most people see of me. It also displays loss of different things such as friendship. It is greatly influenced by personal choice too, which is a way of showing what I like to do in art.

In my artwork it displays my use of various techniques, use of colours and other details. Also for every piece I used layers and as Shrek once said "onions have layers" and Shrek being one of my favourite movies this is the way I decided to include it.

The techniques I used were stencil layering, using the frisket, transfer of print, ink, and spray paint. I used techniques that could easily be layered multiple times. I used these techniques to show layers that are present in a person. I found that using these techniques were the easiest way to show this.



I chose to mainly use the colour purple which is red and blue. On the Korean flag the centre circle (known as Taegeuk) is half blue and the other half is red and these two combined is purple. As half Korean, I wanted a way to show my Korean ethnicity through colours but didn't want to make it too obvious to the viewer so that is why I decided to mainly use purple. Also, in the New Zealand flag, the background is blue so that is another reason to use this colour. Throughout the pieces, there is still obvious sections of blue and red which again reflects the Korean flag and also shows the use of contrast.

My artwork also has white lines which some are broken and never completed and some are reconnected. This can mean lost friendships. The ones that are never completed means I lost the friendship and the ones that reconnect are lost friendships that I later made again.

Throughout the artwork, you'll see hexagons and broken ones. Six is often called a 'lucky number' or a 'balanced number'. In my work, some of the hexagons are broken up and incomplete. This is to show that it cannot be evenly balanced sometimes and luck can sometimes fail. Sometimes the broken hexagons connect to other lines which can mean it turned out fine while others don't which means the opposite. I also prefer even numbers over odd numbers which was a big factor.

Manu Rere Accounting Trip to Auckland

On Friday 06 September, a group of Senior Māori Accounting students from Tauranga Girls' and Tauranga Boys' College travelled to Auckland to visit Price Waterhouse Coopers and Forsyth Barr. Manu Rere was set up by ex-student Tina Kilmister who has been extremely successful in Finance, and as a Māori woman, she wanted to give back to her school by encouraging Māori students to be more aware of the opportunities that exist in Finance. This program has generated a lot of interest in the corporate world and Tina is looking at taking the scheme nationwide to promote more students being educated in the financial sector and to encourage students to pursue these opportunities. We are very fortunate that Tauranga Girls' College has been the pilot school to pursue this program. The students were very informed in all of the opportunities available to them and many of them have decided to pursue a career in Finance. Tina is setting up a contact sheet so our students can help to promote this to others in the future. We are very grateful for this amazing opportunity that Tina has given to our students and look forward to many successes in the future.


The girls had a great team culture and will miss the Year 13 students next year but the remaining students are excited about 2020.

My 10 Day Spirit of New Zealand Voyage

In April this year I was lucky enough to complete a 10 day voyage on the Spirit of NZ . I was in a group of 40 students – 20 boys, 20 girls, plus 14 crew. The trip is well designed so that no students are from the same school, and students travel from Invercargill to the far North for the trip. It's a great way to make new friends from all over NZ. Through the activities we learnt a lot about effective communication, team building, self-esteem, goal setting, and problem solving. There were many activities I enjoyed. On our first day we were kitted up with gear and made to climb up the rigging which is 31m high. We did this in the harbour before we left, so the parents all got to



watch. They were more scared than the students! It was terrifying for everyone, but a great way to overcome any phobia of heights and everyone managed to complete it. We did a lot of land-based activities on Great Barrier Island including hiking up Mount Hobson which is 627m above sea level. It was a tough walk but had amazing views over the Hauraki Gulf. We also did a beach clean-up, and it was nice to see that there wasn't much rubbish on the beach. We had a beach bonfire and BBQ at Smokehouse Bay which is a beautiful secluded bay. We all took turns in small groups doing "night watch". This involved staying awake on deck between 2-5am ensuring that the boat wasn't moving, and there was no fire — which is one of the biggest dangers on the boat. One of the main rules with the trip is that no cell phones are permitted. Although this seemed really harsh, it was a fantastic rule as everyone remained focused and there was lots of talking and laughing. Another rule was jumping off the side of the boat into the water at 6am. This was really challenging because some mornings were really cold. However it's awesome doing something that you normally wouldn't do every morning. I made lots of friends from all over NZ that I still keep in touch with. I would certainly recommend this trip to any student.

Information regarding the Benchmark Exams

All Year 11, 12 and 13 students, are on exam leave from Monday 16 September – Monday 23 September to sit the Tauranga Girls' College Benchmark examinations. These examinations are a practice for the NZQA External examinations starting on 08 November and, are sometimes referred to as the derived grade examinations. A derived grade is used to support a student who, for reasons beyond her control such as illness or trauma, either cannot sit an NCEA exam or, has their performance impaired during the NCEA examinations. For this reason it is important that students prepare themselves thoroughly for the Benchmark examinations. These examination results will also give students valuable feedback on any gaps in their learning as they prepare for the final examinations in November.

If a student is legitimately unable to attend an assessment (eg due to illness or family bereavement), then please notify Mrs Umbers through the School Office 578-8114, on or before the day of the exam, to organise for the exam to be re-scheduled. Please follow this in writing with a Medical Certificate or a letter from home.

The school follows NZQA examination regulations for the Benchmark examinations and assessment is not rescheduled for any circumstances other than illness or a family crisis.

This is a week that is focussed on learning and the school does not organise co-curricular activity for senior students during this week.
