We believe our people are the most important thing. Because of this, we offer a caring, supportive environment for all learners.

There are many people in our team to support our learners. We focus on whanaungatanga by helping everyone develop strong relationships built on respect and care.

Pastoral care

We take a holistic approach to pastoral care. This means we focus on looking after our learner as a whole person and not just parts; we are not just supporting learning but also social, mental and spiritual wellbeing. By doing this, we believe we are supporting everyone to be the best version of themselves.

We support this in many ways; through Whānau Class, Whānau Teacher, Deans, Deputy Principals, the Guidance Counsellors, the Youth Mentors and the Student Health Centre.

External support agencies are also available to support learners through these networks.

Equity support

There are a number of avenues within the kura that address equity. Devices, uniform, lunch and sporting support are provided where need exists. We offer a Kickstart Breakfast Club and are also currently a part of the Ministry of Education donations scheme which significantly reduces many learning costs without compromising on curriculum choice.

Whanaungatanga focus

Our school year begins with a focus on the building of whanaungatanga; a sense of connectedness to one another, our school and our community.

Our Kaupapa Māori approach to our Māori Whānau rōpū immerses learners in Te Reo Māori me ōna Tikanga. These whānau build naturally occurring tuakana-teina relationships.

Mātauranga Māori is the embedding of Māori knowledge including traditions, values, concepts, philosophies, world views and understanding into our learning and teaching is a priority for us.

Whānau Partnership is valued at Tauranga Girls' College, we value our whānau partners and learn and share with one another through our whānau hui, our Māhere Ako (Māori Achievement Plan) mahi, building an understanding of NCEA, Te Ara Ako kōrero and sharing pānui from Iwi Education representatives.

Te Whare o Mereaira - our taonga and where Whanaungatanga begins. It's also where learners meet, share, learn and welcome others.

The Deputy Head Prefect Te Ao Māori, alongside the Prefects of Kaupapa Māori and Tikanga, lead the knowledge building of learners from a Te Ao Māori perspective.

Te Ao Māori is our Year 9 course designed to build and grow a foundation of Mātauranga Māori - Māori knowledge. We explore uara (values), tuakiritanga (identity), a place-based curriculum about Tauranga Moana, Māori tikanga (methods) and hauora (health). This is a half year course and is a compulsory part of the curriculum for all Year 9 students.

Ngā Kohine o Mereiara, our performance rōpū, are our kaitiaki of Te Whare o Mereaira, tikanga leaders and cultural ambassadors of the kura. They manaaki manuhiri, tautoko special events and celebrate Te Ao Māori in the kura.

Te Tauranga o Ngā Waka, our Tauranga Girls' and Tauranga Boys' Colleges kapa haka rōpu, continues to excel and work towards their aspirations of continuing to compete at National level.

Ngā Manu Kōrero speech competitions celebrate and promote the use of Te Reo Māori and Kaupapa Māori.
