Minister of Education announces a number of changes

Chris Hipkins, Minister Education announced a number of changes to the way schools will be operated in the future. These changes are a result of the Tomorrows Schools Review which was conducted through a series of consultation meetings around the country in 2018. Whilst there were deemed some rather radical changes, overwhelming feedback resulted in more moderate responses and are reflected in three key areas:

- 1. Improving educational equity
- 2. Rebuilding trust across the education system
- 3. Deliberate connections and supports across the system

The changes announced include the following

- More frontline support through a new education agency
- More support for Principals and school boards
- New independent disputes panels for parents and students
- Management of school property to be simplified and or transferred to the Ministry
- Enrolment zones to be managed locally not by each school
- A donation scheme that allows state and state integrated decile 1-7 schools to not seek voluntary donations

Opting into the Donation Scheme

Tauranga Girls' College will be opting in to the Ministry of Education's School Donations Scheme for the 2020 year.

This decision has been made in line with the school's first emergent strategic intent of Student-centred Flexible Learning. Learning is designed to include opportunities where every student is encouraged to explore, challenge and innovate so that they may thrive now and move forward with confidence. Board considers reduction in costs to parents a likely contributor to increased student participation in the rich learning opportunities the school offers.

While the \$150 per student offered under the Ministry's scheme will not cover fully the of the opportunities cost provided to our students, the scheme gives the Board the opportunity to review our community funding sources and reduce the burden on families. It is the Board's expectation that we will maintain the current learning offering to our students.

The Board acknowledges the scheme is likely to incur a financial cost to the school. Although it is impossible to quantify exactly the cost of this scheme the Board is committed to underwriting this financial cost to enable the school to trial the scheme for the first year without impacting on the rich learning opportunities afforded to our students.

The actual cost of the scheme will be able to be quantified before the decision for the 2021 year needs to be made.

Cricket Success



Tauranga Girls' College International Department are URGENTLY looking for families to host International Students in 2020. Student stays range from 3 weeks - 1 year.

If you meet this criteria:

- be prepared for anyone living in the home 18+ to have a police check
- can provide a student with their own room
- are not primarily doing it for the money involved
- have a genuine interest in finding out more about other cultures
- are tolerant, have a sense of humour and interact well together
- have an empathy with and understanding of teenagers
- are able to set fair but firm negotiated boundaries
- can provide transport to after school activities
- will provide three meals a day including snacks. This includes any takeaways or meals out with the host family
- to offer regular outings/day trips to points of interest to specifically show your student and to
 encourage her to participate in the family's activities and routines e.g. chores, sports, family holidays
 and outings
- To set reasonable rules

Important Notice from Tauranga City Council

Reopening of Welcome Bay Lane

On Sunday 24 November, Tauranga City Council is reopening Welcome Bay Lane after improving safety at the entry and exit points of this road. If you and your child/ren travel along this section of Welcome Bay Road, please take note of the following.

How to use the new road lay-out: Welcome Bay Lane entry

- If you're driving in a car and turning into Welcome Bay Lane please indicate, slow down and look over your left shoulder for people on bikes.
- If you're travelling on your bike, there are two options. We advise you to divert left off Welcome Bay Road and use a new, off-road shared path and safe crossing point located along Welcome Bay Lane which will bring you back to Welcome Bay Road. The other option, if you are a confident cyclist, is to remain on Welcome Bay Road. Please be aware of cars turning left into Welcome Bay Lane if choosing this option.
- People on foot should continue to use the existing footpath facilities provided.

How to use the new road lay-out: Welcome Bay Lane exit

All road users will need to stop and look for oncoming traffic when exiting Welcome Bay Lane.

NZQA Examinations 2019

The NZQA examinations for 2019 will commence on Friday 08 November and finish on Tuesday 03 December. While the NZQA examinations are held at the Tauranga Girls' College examination centre, they are managed by NZQA and all students must follow the NZQA rules and instructions. All examinations must be sat on the timetabled day and time. If a student misses an examination there is no further opportunity for a re-sit until the NZQA examinations in the following year.

Rules for Candidates:

Follow all instructions of the NZQA supervisor

All work that you submit for marking must be your own

You may only take approved calculators (see your Mathematics teacher for the list of approved calculators into the examination room which have had their memories cleared and have been checked.

You are not allowed to bring the following into the examination room:

Any electronic device (e.g. cell phones and smart watches) unless it is switched off and inside the sealed emergency evacuation pack.

Any paper, except for your admission slip

Any notes in any form

Any watch of any type (digital or analogue).

Admission Slips

You will receive your admission slips:

At the NCEA assembly if you are in Year 11

At the Senior Prize Giving on Monday 04 November if you are in Year 12 or Year 13.

You must take your admission slip to every examination. Do not write on it in any way, at any time. Check that the details on your admission slip are correct. If there is an error in your personal details you must go to the office to get this corrected. If there is an error in your entries you must see the Principal Nominee, Ms Rowlands. It is important to note that a withdrawal from an examination could not occur after 01 September.

Derived Grade

You may apply for a derived grade if:

You were not able to sit the examination because you were sick, you had an accident or there was an unexpected emergency beyond your control.

You think you did not do as well as you could have in the examination for the above reasons.

If you believe that you are eligible for derived grade you must pick the forms (including form to be completed by a medical practitioner.
