Embroidery on your uniform for Year 13's (2020)

NZ Uniforms the current supplier of our school shirt has agreed to put 'Year 13 on the uniform shirt of any current Year 12 student who will be in Year 13 next year. In the past, students in Year 13 had to purchase a different shirt. Now, they can get this added for \$5. This cost will be reimbursed by the school upon receipt.

Only students with Year 13 on their shirts are permitted to leave school grounds during their study periods. The 'Year 13' on the uniform is key to this so please get your shirt embroidered asap.

The following is the procedure for girls who require 'Year 13' or wish to add the Discobolus logo onto their existing school shirt and are currently in Year 12:

Please get this done before or immediately after NCEA exams and well before school begins next year!

- 1. Students drop blouse off to NZ Uniforms, a payment of \$5 per blouse will be required at the time. This will be reimbursed by the school upon receipt.
- 2. Students will be advised to allow 2 weeks for processing, and to then call into the store to pick up.

Note: Blouses must be freshly laundered. NZ Uniforms is located at 94 Elizabeth Street, Tauranga.

If you wish to have discobolus added to your shirt (not polo as this is no longer uniform after 2019) this will cost an additional \$8. Adding discobolus is optional and therefore will not be reimbursed.

Artist of the Week

Chemquest

On the evening of Wednesday 16 October the annual Chemistry Quiz - Chemquest was held at the University of Waikato. A team consists of three students who are currently studying NCEA Level 2 Chemistry. The Quiz is divided into 4 sections - the Periodic Table, Multimedia, Wide World and Music and Demonstrations. In this year's competition there were 60 teams present. Tauranga Girls College entered three teams - Hydrogen, Curie-osities and ForeigNerds.



Duke of Edinburgh Silver Expedition

On 22 September, seven Year 11 girls, who were working towards our Silver Duke of Edinburgh award, travelled to the Bluelight Camp in Taupo for the Adventurous Journey part of the Award. On the first night, we went to the hot pools to relax. Then on Monday, we travelled by boat to see some amazing Māori rock carvings. The weather was not great so it was quite a bumpy ride! We then did an Amazing Race in two teams around the town centre. To add more embarrassment, we had to complete the race in op-shop clothes chosen by our opposition. We then went on a 2 hour walk near Huka Falls. We tried out the thermal pools and then took a plunge in the freezing cold river. On the final day, we decided to do a high ropes course. The weather was not on our side, but we still gave the course a go in the spirit of adventure. The 2 night adventurous journey introduced us to new experiences, challenged us and was heaps of fun. We also did some service during our stay at the Bluelight camp, with our group completing a huge spring clean of the camp.

Junior Model United Nationals Competition

On Saturday 14 September, three Tauranga Girls' College teams entered into the Junior Model United Nations competition, run by the United Nations Association of New Zealand and held at TGC. This year's theme was 'Climate Change', and required delegates to come up with amendments to a pre-written solution, which they would propose and debate with other delegates and their teams. Each team represented one UN member country and had to uphold the views of that country during the event. The TGC teams represented Sweden, Morocco and Tokelau. Tauranga Girls' College was up against thirteen other teams from various BOP schools and participated in moderated debate, public speaking and caucus throughout the day. The day was a great success, with our girls taking out both of the top awards. Team Sweden came first equal with team Finland from Otumoetai College, and team Morocco won best dressed. Seventeen Dance students from Tauranga Girls' College competed in the National Young Performer of the Year Troupe and Modern Soloist awards which took place from 17 - 21 October in Palmerston North. 3 troupes and 6 soloists from across Tauranga were successful with the largest amount of students hailing from Tauranga Girls' College. Of significance to us as college has been the nomination of our Tauranga Girls' College Dance Troupe 'When I was older' who were the only school team in New Zealand to receive a nomination. The girls held their own against the 59 teams competing from around the country for this coveted title scoring incredibly well. While we didn't make the top 18 the girls have made huge progress in their own dancing and the experience of a competition at this level is insane. The adjudicators made special mention of the standout Choreography and teamwork which can be credited to Chris Bae who coached and choreographed this exceptional team. Alongside the competition the girls were also privileged to be able to participate in 3 workshops with the adjudicators which included internationally acclaimed performers and choreographers. Highlights for the students included watching the array of talent from across NZ, performing on an iconic NZ stage, taking part in the workshops, and being away with such an awesome group of friends. The team would like to acknowledge the support of Pub Charity, Legacy Trust, and Tauranga Dance Incorporated who generously donated to provide the team with the opportunity and experience to attend this high calibre event. Alongside our school team it is also important to acknowledge those students who were also competing for outside teams. Tauranga Girls' College has celebrated cultural diversity with International Food Day, Matariki Week, Pacifica performances, and International buddies, among other diversity celebrations to promote inclusion within the school. Yet, when our identities defied heteronormative pressures, we could not turn to our school for a culture developed for (sexually and/or gender) queer students to feel included, visible, and valued; until last term. And so rose the need for a Queer Diversity Support group. Have you heard of us? We are the student-led Queer Youth And Supporters' Group of Tauranga Girls' College and we value and support our LGBT+ peers and their supporters. Meeting in the Wharenui every Wednesday lunch, our confidential group provides a safe space for our students across all age groups to receive and give peer support within our school community. These meetings, though confidential so as to keep our friends and fellow students safe, are open to everyone to attend whether LGBT+ or a straight-cis ally. The importance of this comfortable and social environment resonates with the students attending to celebrate the sexually and gender-queer as a place to feel safe and understood. It is also a place to receive LGBT+ education through guest speakers, group activities noting queer history and achievements, and being able to discuss current queer media and news within the group.

Not only do we provide the space to learn and feel validated within our student body, but Queer Youth And Supporters' Group evidently provides social opportunities to engage with other students with similar experiences or on similar journeys open to offering advice with the lovely Whaea Sue and Ms. Lane within the provided space to guide the conversation healthily and reliably.

The NZQA examinations for 2019 will commence on Friday 8 November and finish on Tuesday 3 November. While the NZQA examinations are held at the Tauranga Girls' College examination centre, they are managed by NZQA and all students must follow the NZQA rules and instructions. All examinations must be sat on the timetabled day and time. If a student misses an examination there is no further opportunity for a re-sit until the NZQA examinations in the following year.

You may only take approved calculators (see your Mathematics teacher for the list of approved calculators) into the examination room which have had their memories cleared and have been checked.

You are not allowed to bring the following into the examination room:

Any electronic device (e.g. cell phones and smart watches) unless it is switched off and inside the sealed emergency evacuation pack.

Any paper, except for your admission slip

Any notes in any form

Any watch of any type (digital or analogue).

Admission Slips

You will receive your admission slips:

At the NCEA assembly if you are in year 11

At the Senior Prize Giving on Monday 4 November if you are in Year 12 or Year 13.

You must take your admission slip to every examination. Do not write on it in any way, at any time. Check that the details on your admission slip are correct. If there is an error in your personal details you must go to the office to get this corrected. If there is an error in your entries you must see the Principal Nominee, Ms Rowlands. It is important to note that a withdrawal from an examination could not occur after 1 September.

Derived Grade

You may apply for a derived grade if:

You were not able to sit the examination because you were sick, you had an accident or there was an unexpected emergency beyond your control.

You think you did not do as well as you could have in the examination for the above reasons.

If you believe that you are eligible for derived grade you must pick the forms (including form to be completed by a medical practitioner.
