Tēnā koe whānau

What an incredible start to Term 2. We have all been a part of history making. Who would have thought the new school term would have begun by staying at home! However, we know that in doing so, we have made a difference by saving lives and reducing the potential pressure hospitals could have been under, as we have now been shown from other parts of the world where restrictions were relaxed.

CONFIDENCE TO OPEN UNDER ALERT LEVEL 2

It is safe to return to school and I know that both students and parents are looking forward to school reopening safely. About 10 staff have already been at school during Alert Level 3 and many have used this time to plan for Monday. You can all be confident that TGC has a robust plan for school to reopen on Monday 18 May. The plan, if you missed receiving it earlier this week, is also on our <u>website</u>.

Here are the main overarching points to assure you:

THE OVERARCHING AIM OF ALERT LEVEL 2 IS TO HAVE YOU SAFELY BACK AT SCHOOL WITH A FEW 'NEW NORMAL' REQUIREMENTS.

We will do this by ensuring that TGC;

- Reduces the risk of someone getting infected in the first place
- Is confident in its ability to identify and contact anyone who becomes infected by following the pandemic plan and MoH guidelines
- Be safe and sensible in our approach as Level 2 is not business as usual
- Meet the Government's expectation of having everyone return back to school

Parents/whānau/staff/students who feel vulnerable have the opportunity to discuss additional measures that they feel may be necessary in order to have the confidence to return (parents talk to the Year Level Dean, Support Colleagues to the Business Manager, Teaching Colleagues to the Principal).

Thank you to those parents who have emailed us and know how important it is to reconnect your daughter with school again. Don't worry, we too are looking forward to seeing everyone back.

THE FIRST WEEK BACK ONSITE AT TGC

The first week back begins with whānau time. Students head to their whānau room by 9am to go over the Alert Level 2 plan and answer any questions BUT it's also a chance to WELCOME your daughter back as we have missed her!! It's time, of course, to be back in uniform (winter uniform), to allow your daughter and teachers to check in with each other and to revise, adapt or review courses and learning plans to ensure everyone's needs are being met. Being able to speak with you and to talk through any concerns you may have in person is key. We know that social interaction with others is necessary to support ongoing well being, and whilst remote learning can work under exceptional circumstances as it did during lockdown, it simply isn't the same and as effective as learning with others, being a part of conversations, collaborating and getting involved in the wider school curriculum such as the arts, sports and culture.

WE CAN FEEL PROUD OF OUR SHARING

Soon after Alert Level 3 began, we issued over 200 devices and 300 packages of printed materials. I am extremely grateful to my team who worked tirelessly to get work or tools (such as devices, keyboards and sewing machines) out to students. Opening over 300 emails, and photocopying resources (tens of reams of paper), printing, collating and sending these was a huge mission. Deliveries were made to most suburbs in Tauranga and to Omokoroa and Matakana Island. Unfortunately, we weren't able to help everyone, especially those wanting internet connections but we endeavoured to support learners where we could. From the feedback we have received, it was indeed appreciated.

RETURNING TO SCHOOL FOR STUDENTS OF ESSENTIAL WORKERS

Under Alert Level 3 (Wednesday 29 April - Wednesday 13 May) school was open to students of essential workers whose daughters could not stay at home. Thank you to those families that worked with us and had the confidence to send their daughters to school knowing that they would be safe, well looked after and given the opportunity to learn remotely from school. We had a fabulous bubble of nine students (at its height) who were supervised by two colleagues along with the DP's and Principal during this time. They followed the strict Level 3 Alert plan and became well rehearsed in washing their hands, using sanitizer, self managing by bringing all that they need for learning and ensuring that they engaged with their class using the google classroom and meet platform. **You were amazing girls! Thank**

Finally, thank you TGC community. I want to assure you that TGC is a safe school to return to. I want you to have the confidence, as I do, knowing that this is a safe, managed environment. We know who is at school, we all have a known plan to follow and we know how important it is to be back and to restart our new normal again. Thanks also to the new families wanting to enrol, this is fantastic. I can't wait for Monday!

EARTH GUARDIAN COMPETITION

Year 9 student Anamaya Taylor was one of six winners in the junior section of the national competition to design an Earth Guardian run by Massey University's College of Creative Arts.

Meet Zanoth... Zanoth is the guardian of NZ's creeks and rocky rapid filled areas. He protects the area, granting permission for only pure souls to cross. Harnessing the power of greenstone scattered across his rocky body type, he can connect with the earth and waters. Zanoth is covered in a thick layer of moss as he lives near a river bed. The greenstone also gives him the ability to speak with the deceased Māori chiefs who tell him how to look after the land. He is a gentle but brave guardian, willing to give his life to protect his sanctuary. He is covered with fierce Māori engravings, each telling a story across his body. He is one of the last of his kind which is what makes him such an important asset in protecting the native land.
